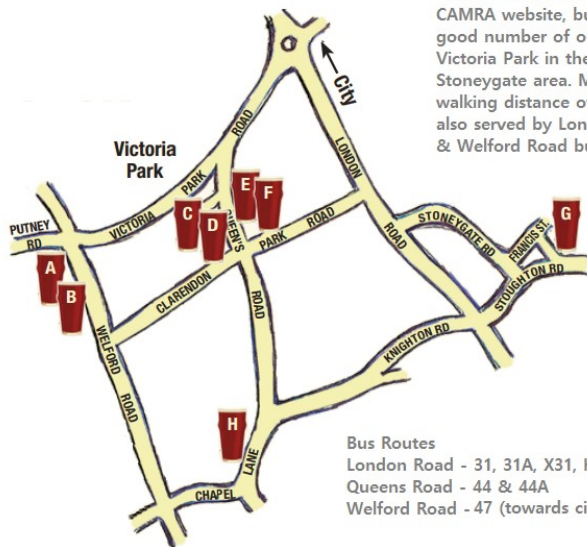


Clarendon Park & Stoneygate

Leicester's suburban pubs are listed on the CAMRA website, but one area that has a good number of outlets is south of Victoria Park in the Clarendon Park & Stoneygate area. Most are within easy walking distance of the City Centre and also served by London Road, Queens Road & Welford Road buses.

London Road - 31, 31A, X31, HH, X3 & X7

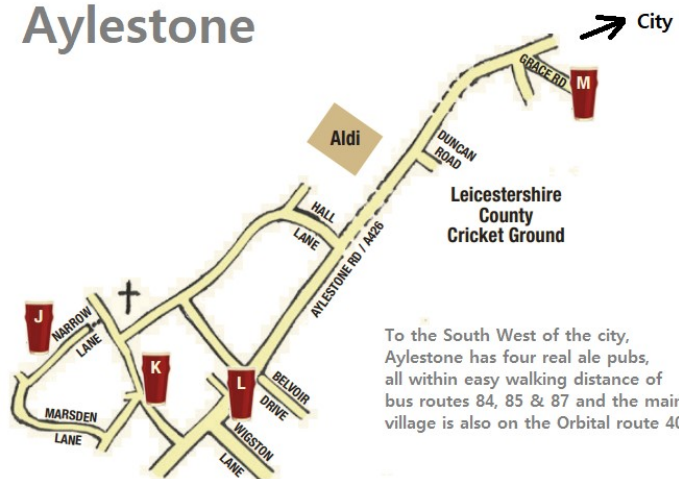

A	New Road Inn 201 Welford Road	B	Donkey 203 Welford Road	C	Babelas 77 Queens Road
Roadside pub in student area. Bare floor boards, wood panelled bar and comfortable seating. Indian food served. Formerly a Leicester Brewing & Malting House, it passed to the now defunct Ansells Brewery in the 1950s. This pub serves two changing beers and two regular beers.		The former Ind Coope's brewery was established at Burton-on-Trent in 1856, and they built this pub in the late 19th century. Look up to see several 'IC' monograms at high level. Live music venue with music most nights from a range of local acts and visitors from further afield.		Spread over two floors with quirky internationally-sourced antiques, this converted wine merchant's shop was converted into a pub in 2002. The large front windows open up to create a continental ambience on warmer days. Two real ales are available.

A micropub opened in a former shop in December 2017 by the Derbyshire based Tollgate Brewery. Modern single-room interior with rustic furniture. The pub sells a constantly varying range of five real ales, including from Tollgate Brewery. Good Beer Guide 2025 entry.		The pub is promoted as a "1940s Cuban American bar". Viewed from the street the front elevation has the appearance of a shop front. Linked by a central vestibule to the adjacent Barceloneta restaurant, so a range of tapas dishes is available. Cask ales are stocked.		Within an area of Victorian housing close to the university and Queens Road, this corner pub was built in 1936. Refurbished in 2019, the pub retains a traditional and relaxed locals' character. There is a modern conservatory and courtyard at rear. A range of different real ales is available.	
G	Real Ale Classroom 22 Allandale Road	H	Craddock Arms 201 Knighton Road		
Classroom themed micropub run by in a converted shop. The furniture includes reclaimed desks with original graffiti and the beers are written up on a blackboard. Cask, key-keg ales and ciders are served from a home made chiller cabinet behind the bar. 2025 Good Beer Guide entry.		Thatched village pub in what is now a city suburb. Originally the Bulls Head, in 1855 it was renamed after Sir Edmond Craddock-Hartopp, who owned most of Knighton parish at that time. In 1907, it was leased by Everards who acquired the pub in 1925. Beers from Everards Brewery.

J	Black Horse 65 Narrow Lane	K	Union Inn 27 Middleton Street
Welcoming traditional Victorian pub with distinctive bar servery in a village conservation area on the city's edge. Sympathetically refurbished in 2018. Everards Tiger plus a varying selection of real ales are available and home-cooked food is served. 2025 Good Beer Guide entry.		A two-roomed traditional drinkers wet-trade only pub. On the left is a plain public bar with darts, pool, TVs and music. A quieter lounge bar is on the right. This pub serves one changing beer (Occasional guest) and one regular beer.	
L	Ale Stone 660 Aylestone Road	M	Cricketers 1 Grace Road
A Micropub converted from a shop in 2017. The nicely furnished interior has wooden benches and a large barrel with a millstone top forms a table in the centre. Up to three real ales, plus two ciders, stillaged in a glass-fronted "cellar" visible from the bar. A 2025 Good Beer Guide entry.		Situated adjoining County Cricket ground. The interior consists of a public bar with pool tables at the front, an extended lounge bar with family/dining annex and an upstairs function room with balcony overlooking the cricket ground. Beers from Everards Brewery.	



To the South West of the city, Aylestone has four real ale pubs, all within easy walking distance of bus routes 84, 85 & 87 and the main village is also on the Orbital route 40
